Giving a Witness Talk—ACMA Manual, part 4

The prime purpose of a witness talk is to demonstrate the effectiveness of the Cursillo method in the life of the speaker.

Ideally the witness speaker is a member of a group reunion that has been instrumental in nurturing and supporting them. Consequently the speaker may refer to many aspects of Christian life and confirm the value of the Cursillo method.

Witness speakers at Ultreyas give witness to a person's growth in union with Jesus Christ so that others may be encouraged to go and do likewise. Witness talks expose others to the different apostolic life styles within the Christian community. Listeners encounter a broad range of possibilities for Christian growth and action. The speakers offer concrete examples of living what is fundamental for being a Christian in family, neighbourhood, place of work, or with friends. It is sharing in a practical way. The talk is a witness to one's recent experience in the Fourth Day.

A witness talk is delivered as a living experience of what one is or believes. A truth is presented, e.g. God is love, and then an experience from the life of the speaker is used

to illustrate that truth. The witness should not be an instruction or intellectual exercise but a personal sharing of one's:

 \Box growing union with Christ.

 $\hfill\square$ growing in the knowledge of Christ.

The three essential elements of a witness talk therefore are —

- a truth, that comes through the outline of the talk
- a life: that of the person giving the talk
- a living experience, that gives witness to the truth, present and being lived in the person

The talk should be kept simple and short.

A witness talk is not:-

Giving a Witness Talk, contd.

Those who live close to God reflect God. It is important that those who share do so because of the testimony of the life they live and not because it is their turn. Nobody should be pressured to give a witness talk and anyone may decline to do so.


Witness speakers must liaise with the Spiritual Advisor of the Ultreya before the Ultreya so that a summary and interpretation of the talk in the light of the Gospel may be prepared. Ideally a copy of the talk is forwarded to the Spiritual Advisor a week prior to the Ultreya.

If you are asked to give a witness talk, don't panic and say 'no'. Take it to God in prayer. Even the most nervous speakers have given some of the most meaningful witness talks as they are among loving and caring Christians.

Even so, it may occasionally happen that you feel that your spiritual experience has been moving and profound in a particularly personal sense, and because of its uniqueness you are reluctant to share it with others in public. If you feel this way, rest assured that those feelings will be understood and respected.

After the witness talk, the Spiritual Advisor for the Ultreya then takes those present to the theme of the talk, relating it to the Gospel.

A message from Rev Canon Ian Mabey, Spiritual Advisor

Dear Cursillistas



The Secretariat are looking at running a pilgrimage in 2024. At this stage we are looking for expressions of interest from those who might like to be a participant and also from people who may like to be a part of a team formed to run such an event. Please see below for the broad outline which we are working with. If you would like to be involved or know someone who would like to be involved please make contact vie email with me. At this point it is just an idea that we would like to work with others to develop.

Proposal Cursillo pilgrimage of encouragement and Love.

To invite people to travel through the eastern wheatbelt to encourage and remember communities of worship through the isolated communities of the diocese. Holding morning prayer, holy communion and evening prayer in the churches both still in regular use and those who are not currently hosting regular worship. Through the spirit of Ultreya and rooted in our deep love for one another we celebrate the pioneers and stalwarts of our diocese while each individually coming closer to God through pilgrimage and prayer.

Time

The concept is to travel independently in a week starting on a Monday and finishing on a Saturday in the period of time just before the school holidays in September 2024. Suggested week is Monday 16th September to Saturday 21st September. People would be responsible for their own accommodation and meals and could join and leave the pilgrimage at any point along the way. (We would just ask that they let us know for duty of care). People with caravans and mobile homes could use local parks or free camping locations, others could use local accommodation options in nearby towns.

Services

With possibly 17 stop overs and services it is proposed that team members be asked to take responsibility for time at each church: a service, a reflection on the past of the church and a challenge to understand the future of the community in which the church is situated. What role and response could the church be taking? The three pillars which are taught in the Cursillo movement of Piety, Study and Apostolic Action being the basis of the time spent in each church.


