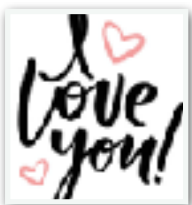

I recently I started looking at this year's Lenten studies from the Bishop - *Growing in Love and Encouragement for One Another* - which our Diocesan President attached to February's 'Wendy's Writings'. I think it will be an interesting course.

I find it is very easy to tell myself that I love someone. But what about the encouragement? I have worked out that to really show love for a person and encourage them I have to DO something about it -



Tell them that I love/ appreciate/ admire them.
Do something to show this. It may be taking the time to visit, talk or make a phone call.
I could buy a small gift, or take some flowers, or a rose from the garden. These acts show that I was thinking about them when they were not there.
If I am able and they have a need, I can offer to do something to help them.

This practical loving is what I think is meant by encouragement; it's doing and not just saying.

Of course, there are times when we have to call someone into question to show that we really love them. I was recently going through some old letters and I found one from my father who loved me very dearly. I was at Uni and involved in far too many things He warned me about trying to do too much, wanting to be all things to all people. And he was right. He loved me and he called me into question.

But it is NOT possible to do this with everyone we love. Jesus was very good at it and knew exactly who to say this to - for example to Peter - "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things." If Jesus said this to me I would consider myself loved, though it would not be easy to accept!

Our faith comes from hearing the word of God. May our action towards helping others emulate the love you have for us. We choose to put actions behind our faith today, trusting you are at work in our lives.

From the President – Autumn 2024

Salt, to be effective, must be in contact with the meat or fish it is to preserve. To be effective, we must be involved where we work and where we live. Bible Commentary / Produced by TOW Project



If we are the salt and light of the world (Matthew 5.13-14), how do we live this out? How do we be salt and light and shine brightly?

Dan Rhodes wrote in 2017:

‘Every Christian is called by God to be an influence on the world around them. Jesus began teaching this concept early in his ministry when he told his disciples that he would make them fishers of men. (Matthew 4:19) Then, in the Sermon on the Mount, he used the illustrations of salt and light. (Matthew 5:13-16) Both salt and light have properties which affect things around them. Salt is used to enhance flavour, and as a preservative. To 'be salt' means to deliberately seek to influence the people in one's life by showing them the unconditional love of Christ through good deeds. Light is a symbol used to mean awareness, knowledge, and understanding. To 'be light' means to be a witness to others concerning the truth of God's Word, especially about who Christ is and how he died and rose again for our salvation.’

Could it be this simple? By ‘doing’ good things we show those around us what it is like to be embraced by the unconditional love that Christ offers to all. As a witness for Christ we share how that love came to be.

Doing good things seems to be easy. We give baptismal gifts, anniversary cards, joy bags/boxes, care packages, dignity bags, wedding Bibles; we sponsor holidays in our caravan; we engage with the Angel Tree project; we knit blankets, beanies, baby clothes, toys and more to give away; we care for housebound members, we visit the aged and the infirm, we provide meals for the sick and disadvantaged; and we do so much more. Being a witness for Christ may seem a little more challenging. After all, what does this really mean?

Each Wednesday, following the reading of the Psalm in morning prayer, we hear the words ‘We consecrate this day to your service, O Lord; may all our thoughts, words and actions be well-pleasing to you and serve the good of our brothers and sisters; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Does this sound familiar? Consider the words of Mary Sumner’s personal prayer:

‘All this day, O Lord, let me touch as many lives as possible for thee;
and every life I touch, do thou by thy spirit quicken,
whether through the word I speak, the prayer I breathe, or the life I live.
Amen.

Both of these prayers share the essence of Christian witness. It is by our words, our actions and our thoughts (our prayers and attitudes), that we demonstrate to others the forgiveness and eternal life offered to us through our belief in Christ.

Blessings to you all, Well it's hard to believe that it is late February already, and we have had Ash Wednesday and started the season of Lent.

Perhaps I am surprised, and it snuck up on me this year, because the family and I were distracted by the birth of little Daniel Joshua on the 8th February. My daughter Raelene dropped off her two-year-old at 3 in the morning on the way to the hospital earlier in the month, only to return a couple of days later and retrieve her, and then a few days later we started all over again, but praise God, eventually the baby arrived.

I have often found over the years, that God uses these unplanned, messy times; you know this gave me plenty of time with Elizabeth and plenty of time to reflect upon new life. I am sure there are many other grandparents or parents or aunties and uncles reading this and saying to themselves; Cathie I know exactly what you mean..... when our kids were born

Anyway, I mention this for two reasons, firstly to share with you all, my brothers and sisters in Christ, the joyous news of Daniel's safe arrival. And secondly because in the season of Lent we often think about the wilderness, suffering and pain, repentance and renewal. But it is also an opportunity to reflect upon creation, new life, and new beginnings.

SOCIAL ISSUES AND ACTION REPORT

As I write this report I heard some good news just recently, the Federal Government is to ban the sale of Vapes. This comes as a great relief it will protect the health of our young people, particularly in regard to lung diseases. Apparently in some States however they are being imported on the black market and gangs are involved, so we hope this actually works. I believe the Cloud Nine shop in Albany remains closed at present.

The conflict between Israel and Palestine is a dreadful issue where many innocent lives have been lost. If the Hamas group would go ahead and release the Israeli hostages it would help. A difficult and deadly situation for many ordinary Palestinian citizens and all of us feel for the many affected.

The war in Ukraine continues. Unfortunately there seems to be no desire to end the war from the Russian leaders and there is not much chance of a change in the Leadership in Russia as all those who stand in opposition for the coming election appear to have been denied the opportunity for many varied and spurious reasons. A democracy in name only it seems. We need to constantly pray for peace in our world.

Issues such as homelessness continue. I have heard through our Katanning Regional Emergency Accommodation Manager, that as far as State Housing homes are concerned in our area, if a home falls into disrepair for whatever reason, vandalism etc, there is one team that works in three towns Katanning, Narrogin and Wagin. Of course this then makes the progress of repairing these properties slow denying a possible tenant the opportunity to rent a home. Another issue is the rising costs of rental for many throughout Australia.

We can only hope and pray that as time goes by things will begin to improve. For we Christians that begins with our earnest prayers. *Sylvia Spicer: Social Issues and Action Coordinator*

More news from Liz Byleveld who is working with the Mothers Union in the Diocese of Kapsabet, Kenya



The Baby clothes and blankets were extremely well appreciated. (See the picture on the left.) Usually they are taken to the Kipmoro Mission Hospital but this time half of them were taken to the Hospital and the other half were shared out between the Mother's Union areas to be handed out to those in the area.

I handed out to three children this week. One was a toddler of a mother attached to one of the primary schools. The picture below, the baby has a cleft lip and I gave her a blanket. The other was for a deaf girl who got taken advantage of and had a baby - We gave her a couple of outfits.

This picture on the right was of the PITA (Widows and Single Mothers) group and their soap making business. The soap is sold for the mother's union Quota and it is also exchanged as school fees for those who can't afford the cost. It was a really touching time, also because I was able to share with them that God sees and knows them and he can use their tough times. A few of them then shared their stories which Mama Alice has never known them to do. So it was a time of healing. I was touched that I could be part of that.



Further comments from Liz:



One of my highlights was visiting an old grandmother to give her communion. She has been in a wheelchair for 14 years with her needing help to do everything, yet her faith and gratitude is inspiring.

The last thing that caught my attention is that almost every church I went to was connected to one of the nearby schools. The Mothers Union is doing mentoring in a number of them and the big thing they wanted me to encourage was that they work hard and improve their circumstances. I have to admit my word of encouragement was to leave a legacy wherever they were, whether in University, Overseas or in their own community. I used 1 Tim 4:12, that they don't have to wait to be grown up to be an example.

'We should not ask, 'What is wrong with the world?' for that diagnosis has already been given. Rather we should ask, "What has happened to the salt and light?'
